When 50 million acres of the Tongass National Forest became unprotected, she knew she needed to fight for her community who lived off the land and for nature itself. Along with Women's Earth and Climate Action Network (WECAN), Culp organized multiple action campaigns and protests. This passion expanded to include gender equality and fighting the climate crisis. Defending the Tongass Rainforest of Alaska through Women-led Indigenous Action

Tongass National Forest is the largest national forest in the United States. It is the traditional homeland of the Tlingit, Haida, and Tsimshian Peoples and is a vital, biodiverse-rich carbon sink. The Tongass Rainforest Protection Project is working specifically to protect 9.2 million acres of this pristine wilderness from harmful industries like logging and mining that threaten the region. With Indigenous women leaders at its forefront, the project's goal is to protect the ancient forest and defend their traditional way of life.
